- **Oversized Options:** For individuals over 300 lbs, consult your provider for custom sizing. Additional supports may be needed for burial or display.

- **Metal Urns:** Bronze and stainless steel offer timeless elegance and durability. These are ideal for burial or outdoor niches due to their weather resistance.

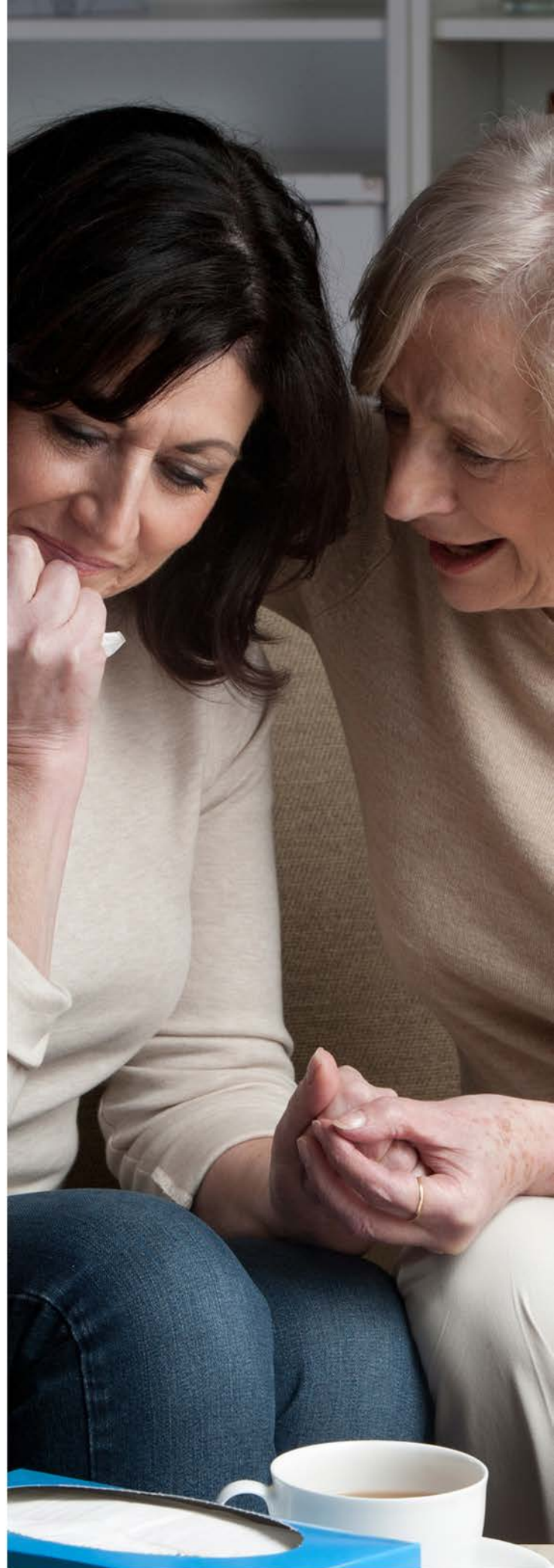
