Veteran Funeral Benefits

Burial in a National Cemetery

Burial in a National Cemetery signifies the highest honor bestowed upon those who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces. It is a final resting place reserved for veterans, their spouses, and eligible dependents, offering a dignified and perpetual tribute to their service and sacrifice.

Military Headstone or Marker

A military headstone or marker is a distinctive memorial that identifies and honors the service of a deceased member of the U.S. Armed Forces. It includes their name, rank, branch, dates, and often religious emblem. These permanent tributes, typically provided by the VA, are found in various types ofcemeteries.

Military Funeral Honors

Military funeral honors are a solemn and respectful tribute provided by the U.S. government to eligible veterans and service members as a final recognition of their service. These honors typically include the playing of Taps, the folding and presentation of the American flag to the next of kin, and a rifle salute (in some cases).

Presidential Memorial Certificate

A Presidential Memorial Certificate is an engraved paper certificate, signed by the current President of the United States, to honor the memory of honorably discharged deceased veterans.

VA Burial Allowance

The VA burial allowance is financial aid from the Department of Veterans Affairs to help with eligible veterans' burial and funeral expenses. The amount varies based on service status, date of death, and whether it was service-connected, providing some relief to families and honoring the veteran's service.

Applying for Benefits

NOTE: It is highly recommended to start the application process as soon as possible. Don't hesitate to reach out to the VA or a Veterans Service Organization if you encounter any difficulties or have questions along the way. They are there to assist you in navigating this process and ensuring your loved one receives the honors they deserve.

Burial in a National Cemetery

- Step 1: Verify Eligibility: Contact the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at 1-800-535-1117 or visit their website:
- Step 2: Gather Documentation: Prepare the veteran's discharge papers (DD-214 or equivalent), death certificate, and any marriage or dependency certificates if applicable.
- Step 3: Schedule Burial: Once eligibility is confirmed, work with the National Cemetery Scheduling Office to choose a burial date and location.

Military Headstone or Marker

- Step 1: Download the Application: Obtain VA Form 40-1330,
 Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker, from the VA website:
- Step 2: Complete the Form: Fill out the form accurately and completely, providing all required information about the veteran and the burial location.
- Step 3: Submit the Application: Mail the completed form to the VA National Cemetery Administration at the address provided on the form.

Military Funeral Honors

- Step 1: Inform the Funeral Home: Notify the funeral director of your desire for military funeral honors.
- Step 2: Provide Documentation: Share the veteran's discharge papers (DD-214) with the funeral home.
- **Step 3: Coordination:** The funeral home will typically coordinate with the local military installation to arrange the honors.

Presidential Memorial Certificate

- Step 1: Download the Application: Obtain VA Form 40-0247,
 Application for Presidential Memorial Certificate, from the VA website:
- Step 2: Complete the Form: Accurately fill out the form, providing the required information about the veteran and the next of kin.
- Step 3: Submit the Application: Mail the completed form to the VA National Cemetery Administration at the address provided on the form.

VA Burial Allowance

- Step 1: Choose the Appropriate Form: Select either the full VA
 Form 21P-530 or the simplified VA Form 21P-530EZ based on your circumstances. Both can be accessed at:
- Step 2: Complete the Form: Provide all necessary information about the veteran, their service, and the circumstances of their death.
- Step 3: Submit the Application: Mail the completed form to your VA regional office. You can find the address for your regional office on the VA website.
